





January 2012 - August 2023 744 Properties Demolished




Who Was Responsible?

GREATER OHIO POLICY CENTER – GENERAL DATA PRINCIPLES

General Principles for Data Management

- Keep meticulous, machine-readable records
- Strongly request or require contractors + partners to collect and report data on any intervention that they did with landbank support
- Be consistent with how data is entered
 - Create an internal style guide
 - "junk in, junk out"



GREATER OHIO POLICY CENTER - TRACK DATA



Track Demographics

(Can be done by contractors or partners)

- If business is WBE, MBE, EDGE, VBE
- # of employees that identify as minority &/or as women
- Demographics of buyers or final end users
 - Race/ethnicity
 - Gender
 - Income level (% of AMI is fine)
 - Are they parents of minor children or caregivers of adults
 - Are they single parents
 - Is the household multigenerational? (ex: grandparents + kid + grandkids



Track Change

- Note what the tax collections were in the year before land bank intervention; note the date of that tax year.
- Take before and after pics (require contractors if necessary)
 - Make sure they are nice photos with blue skies, green grass, residents doing activities + smiling, etc.
- Estimate hours it takes to do a job ("land bank has funded over 5,000 hours of labor, cleaning up our neighborhoods")



GREATER OHIO POLICY CENTER - MANAGE PARTNERS

- Strongly request or require contractors + partners to collect and report data on any intervention that they did with landbank support.
 - Provide a template for them to complete
- Require partners to acknowledge the land bank when the land bank is involved in one of their projects
- Track leverage rates and/or have partners report leverage rates ("for every land bank \$1 spent on demolition, townships + municipalities spent another \$2.")
